

BUILDING DREAMS

If you have driven by the site of our new Mark West Area Community Park, located at 4614 Old Redwood Highway, you may have noticed some dirt has been moved and construction activity has begun. The Mark West Area Community Fund, our community's 501-c3 nonprofit, is working to secure the final permits needed to construct the park this summer and fall.Below are a few updates on the park development:

First and foremost – a quick shout out to our non-profit, all volunteer board of directors! This includes Steve Plamann, Dmitri Menzel, Roni Berg, Westin Miller, Heidi Would, Karen Fies, Ron Calloway and Brad Sherwood. These incredible, community-driven individuals have spent countless hours over the last two years working to make this park a reality. Our board is doing serious work behind the scenes to pull all the pieces together and we are so thankful for each one of them. THANK YOU!!!!











New Mark West Area Community Park Under Construction

The Mark West Area Community Fund is now officially the owner of the park property after nearly a year of collaboration and partnership with the Sonoma Land Trust. The MWACF is thankful for the tremendous partnership with Sonoma Land Trust. Thank you SLT!

Thanks to Sonoma County voters approving Measure F in 2006 to extend a quarter-cent sales tax through 2031, Ag + Open Space has been able to fund projects like our Mark West Area Community Park. The Mark West Area Community Park has benefited from this sales tax through Ag + Open Space's Community Space Matching Grant program. We received \$1,169,500 for the acquisition of the property along with an additional \$300,000 to help support design and planning, and development of basic infrastructure including ADA-compliant pathways and parking.

If you have driven by the park property lately you may have noticed some construction activity! We are starting to clear the property in preparation for grading/drainage work. NorCal Excavation and Trucking has donated their time and equipment to do this work for us - thank you NorCal! Lelo Martinez is an incredible community leader and supporter of the MWACF!

Permitting update - We continue to navigate the permitting process. We have received our use permit and grading/drainage permit. Construction permits for the playground and utility shed are being finalized now. We are grateful for the collaboration with Tennis Wick and his team at Permit Sonoma! Thank you!

Playground equipment, exercise station and picnic tables have been ordered. We anticipate delivery in late July. Installation begins immediately when we receive the equipment - so hopefully in July - and should take a month, or two at most to fully install the playground. Thank you to the Saba Foundation for their ongoing support of funding our park playground and equipment!

BC Engineering is managing our park construction process. William Billeter and his team are top notch, and we can't say thank you enough for their guidance and support.

Holly Construction is partnering with us to build the Doug Williams Gazebo. Thank you!!

Community Soils continues to lead park design and coordination with our construction team. Josho Somine and his team are master park designers!

Pete Lescure Engineering has finalized drainage work which is critical in receiving our construction permits and getting this park built. Thanks, Pete!

Steve Klick with Bauer Associates, Geotechnical Consultants, completed our soil survey at no cost to the nonprofit and park – thank you so much Steve and the team at Bauer Associates!

Brian Curtis and his team at Curtis and Associates conducted the staking for the grading and drainage to be completed. Much appreciation to Brian and the team at Curtis and Associates for the swift and professional work!

Ongoing fundraising support is needed as we continue to implement our full park design plan. For example, for \$2,500 you can help place a bench at the park and have your name or organization engraved into the bench. Message from Sheriff Engram

I have great news to share!

The Sheriff's Office is fully funded for the 2025–2026 fiscal year with a budget of \$246 million, ensuring no disruptions to our services or programs.

I'm especially pleased to announce continued funding for our critical efforts in the fight against opioids. The budget supports a dedicated five-person Narcotics Unit for the upcoming fiscal year.

This team has already made a remarkable impact. In just five months, they made 78 arrests, seized dozens of firearms, confiscated tens of thousands of dollars in cash, and removed more than \$2 million worth of drugs from our streets.

I want to sincerely thank the Board of Supervisors and the County Administrator's Office for their ongoing support. I look forward to building on this momentum and continuing our work to keep the community safe.

Canine Companions Graduation at MADF

Last September, the Sheriff's Office partnered with Canine Companions to launch an innovative puppy training program inside our Main Adult Detention Facility (MADF). Select incarcerated individuals were chosen to raise and train service-dog puppies, learning vital life skills rooted in consistency, responsibility, accountability, and empathy.

The 12–16-month program starts with puppies aged 2–4 months and involves both incarcerated and community trainers. Together, they lay the groundwork for these dogs to become future service animals.

We're thrilled to celebrate our first graduating class! In late June, several pups completed their in-facility training and are now advancing with Canine Companions to one day assist individuals in our community.

We're grateful for this partnership with Canine Companions, which equips incarcerated individuals with meaningful skills and relationships while providing our community with highly trained service dogs.

Property Crimes Detectives Investigation-Scam Alert

Our Property Crimes Detectives recently investigated a courier scam targeting older adults in our community. Scammers, posing as banks, law enforcement agencies, or delivery services, exploit trust by creating a sense of urgency—claiming compromised accounts or held packages—to steal cash, bank cards, or personal information. They may arrange courier pickups, send fake delivery notifications with malicious links, or use cash-on-delivery (COD) schemes with worthless items.

Stay alert. Here are a few ways to protect yourself and others:

- Always verify unexpected calls or messages with official sources
- Never give out your PIN, account numbers or passwords
- Be cautious with unexpected deliveries or cash-on-delivery packages
- Report any suspicious activity to law enforcement

Stay vigilant and spread awareness to protect vulnerable neighbors.


Summer Water Safety

As temperatures rise and more people head to our rivers, lakes, and coastal areas, it's important to keep safety top of mind. Each year, preventable accidents occur on the water—many of which can be avoided with a few simple precautions.

Here are a few key safety tips to help you and your loved ones stay safe this summer:

- Wear a life jacket: Make sure everyone—especially children—wears a properly fitted life jacket.
- Drink responsibly: If anyone chooses to consume alcohol while on or near the water, please do so responsibly. Alcohol can impair your judgement and potentially lead to dangerous situations. It can also lead to a boating under the influence arrest.
- Stay alert and know the conditions: Waterways like the Russian River and the Sonoma Coast can be unpredictable. Know the current, depth, and weather forecast before heading out.
- Supervise children closely: Even shallow water can be dangerous. Always have a responsible adult actively watching.
- Be prepared: Check your gear, tell someone your plans, and know emergency contact numbers.

Whether you're paddling, swimming, or just relaxing near the shore, a little preparation can make all the difference. Let's work together to keep this summer safe and enjoyable for everyone



INTRODUCING PIGEONLY

We're updating how non-privileged mail is processed at the Sonoma County Jail to help improve efficiency, safety, and service. Starting September 1, 2025, all non-privileged incarcerated persons' mail must be sent through Pigeonly, a secure digital mail service.

Pigeonly allows friends and family to send letters and photos to their incarcerated loved ones more conveniently—either online or by mailing items directly to a new designated address. The service helps streamline mail delivery, reduce contraband, and ensure messages get to inmates faster and more reliably.

Privileged mail (such as legal or court-related correspondence) will not be affected by this change and must still be sent directly to the jail.



The Cold Case Unit Needs Your Help!



The Sonoma County Sheriff's Office Cold Case Unit is actively pursuing justice for victims like Alfonso Reyes Martinez, a 50-year-old brutally shot and buried in a shallow grave near the Alexander Valley Bridge, north of Healdsburg, on May 20, 1996. While Tiburcio Ramirez Olivero, an 18-year-old Healdsburg transient, was convicted as an accessory to murder, the prime suspect, Antonio Bravo Marquez, remains at large. Known by aliases such as Antonio Marquez Bravo or Antonio Brava, Marquez likely fled to Fresno or Mexico.

Marquez is a 61-year-old Hispanic male, 5'3", with a medium build, short black hair, brown eyes, and possibly a light mustache. At the time of the murder, Bravo was employed as vineyard laborer and lived in a transient encampment near the intersection of Highway 128 and Alexander Valley Road. He was known to drive a white or tan 1973 Ford Maverick with a brown vinyl top.

We urge anyone with information about Antonio Bravo Marquez's whereabouts to come forward and help bring closure to Martinez's family. Please contact the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office at (707) 565-2727. To stay anonymous, submit tips online at sonomasheriff.org/silent-witness.

LARKFIELD WATER TREATMENT PLANT PROJECT

In our ongoing commitment to improving the Larkfield water system, California American Water will be installing a new water storage tank and booster pump station at the Larkfield Water Treatment Plant.

The project is part of California American Water's commitment to ongoing infrastructure investments to improve service.



PROJECT SCOPE AND SUMMARY

California American Water's project will include the addition of a new 500,000-gallon storage tank and booster pump station at the Larkfield Water Treatment Plant. Both will be used for domestic and fire demands. This project also includes a new emergency standby generator, electrical service upgrades, and perimeter fencing.

Your safety, as well as the safety of your neighbors and our workers, is important to us! We work hard to keep our job sites safe, and we appreciate your effort to slow down and use caution around the construction site.

SONOMA PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE



Summertime means construction time for Sonoma County Public Infrastructure as we work diligently to complete critical road repair and maintenance projects before the weather changes.

Current Projects

We have six active construction projects occurring throughout the county. Here are the flash updates:

- Wohler Bridge over the Russian River bridge retrofit project is on target for completion of the foundation work by fall.
- Contractors are installing a temporary bridge as they continue repairs on the Geysers Road Bridge over Frasier Creek, east of Cloverdale.
- Over at North Fitch Mountain, in Healdsburg, construction crews are installing drainage as part of the 2017 landslide repair.
- Storm damage restoration is taking place on Pine Mountain Road on the northern most side of Sonoma County where recently a temporary traffic signal was installed.
- Stewarts Point Skaggs Road in Geyserville is on track with slide repair construction tasks.
- And on Westside Road, contractors are installing a retaining wall as part of its slide repair plan.

We also have a flurry of road maintenance projects under our Pavement Preservation Program.

We sincerely thank the community for your continued patience and understanding as roads and bridges are closed for repairs while we work diligently to ensure our roads remain safe and accessible for Sonoma County residents and visitors.

SONOMA COUNTY UPDATE DISTRICT 4 SUPERVISOR JAMES GORE



In a recent interview on KRCB's The 707, Supervisor James Gore reflected on his term as President of the National Association of Counties (NACo), where he represented more than 3,000 counties across the U.S. His leadership on the national stage has helped secure real results for Sonoma County.osed federal cuts to FEMA that would shift disaster response costs onto local governments.

From leading FEMA reform efforts to advocating for more responsive federal disaster aid, Supervisor Gore has used our county's hard-earned experience with wildfires, flooding, and recovery to drive national policy change. He extended NACo's Intergovernmental Disaster Reform Task Force in direct response to proposed federal cuts to FEMA that would shift disaster response costs onto local governments.

"Sonoma County's experience has become a model for how counties across the nation can build resilience," Gore said. "And I've worked to make sure our challenges and our lessons are driving better policy in Washington."

His national role has also opened doors to grant opportunities and state and federal funding streams. Gore has teamed up with county departments to secure major investments in permanent supportive housing, climate resilience, and infrastructure. These efforts include funding from FEMA hazard mitigation programs and state grants that have helped fast-track local housing and water projects.

"Every time I meet with federal agencies, I have a list of Sonoma County priorities in my hand," he said. "I'm not just there to represent counties broadly—I'm there to deliver for our community."

Gore also emphasized why local government leadership matters now more than ever: "Counties are in the trenches of democracy. We don't just debate—we deliver. And what happens at the local level affects people's lives every single day."

A PRUDENT BUDGET FOR UNCERTAIN TIMES

The Sonoma County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to adopt a balanced budget for the 2025–26 fiscal year, which began July 1. While the budget reflects a commitment to core services and long-term financial stability, the Board noted that future adjustments may be necessary depending on changes in state or federal funding.

The adopted budget includes \$459 million in discretionary General Fund revenue and a total of \$2.33 billion from all sources, including \$918 million in state and federal funding. It also includes a net reduction of 12 full-time equivalent positions, resulting in a County workforce of 4,490.

The Board reaffirmed its commitment to paying down unfunded pension liabilities, setting aside 0.5 percent of payroll for prepayments on that debt. Supervisors also approved ongoing funding for the Sheriff's Office narcotics unit, transitioning it from a two-year pilot program to a permanent part of public safety operations.

The Board emphasized that the County's budget reflects local priorities—fiscal responsibility, essential services, and adaptability in the face of an evolving economic landscape.

Preliminary Count Shows 23% Drop in Sonoma County Homelessness

Sonoma County saw a significant decrease in homelessness this year, according to preliminary results from the 2025 Point-in-Time Count, which recorded 1,952 people experiencing homelessness—a 23% drop from 2024 and the lowest total since the count began in 2007.

The number of unsheltered individuals fell by 29%, a decrease of 570 people. County officials credit new housing initiatives and targeted support services as key drivers of the improvement.

While this progress is encouraging, officials also cautioned that looming state and federal funding cuts could reverse these gains. A full report, including demographic breakdowns and city-by-city data, will be released later this summer.



Planning For A Resilient Water Future



Sonoma Water has released an updated Water Supply Roadmap, a forward-looking plan to secure and enhance our region's water resilience through 2045. This strategic document outlines a portfolio of projects designed to increase water supply, improve system redundancy, and adapt to the realities of climate change and drought.

Key initiatives include Forecast-Informed Reservoir Operations (FIRO) at Lake Mendocino and Lake Sonoma, innovative Aquifer Storage and Recovery (ASR) projects in Sebastopol and along Occidental Road, and potential new infrastructure like a secondary outlet from Lake Sonoma. Together, these efforts could add more than 100,000 acre-feet of water supply annually over the coming decades.

The roadmap also emphasizes regional partnerships, such as the Eel-Russian Diversion Project, which aims to sustain vital seasonal diversions from the Eel River to the Russian River watershed after PG&E decommissions the Potter Valley Project.

By investing in these solutions now, Sonoma Water is working to ensure reliable, sustainable water supplies for future generations. To explore the full plan and learn how these projects will benefit our communities:
